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USING LITERACY FAIRS TO BUILD READING COMPREHENSION

Summary



Abstract

Learn how to host a literacy fair (similar to a science fair) to awaken your students' passion for reading and facilitate project based learning in a virtual setting. Literacy Fairs are a simple way to practice higher order thinking skills and move to the 'create' level of Bloom's Taxonomy. Novel projects have become a great alternative to the typical book report or assessment. Learn how to encourage students to engage in a novel project or author study to apply their comprehension and presentation skills. They are a great way to inspire a love for reading in your classroom and build community in the virtual setting.

Learning Objectives

Participants will learn how to

- create a hook and set up a literacy fair to engage students in a passion project about a book or author of their choosing.
- guide students and learning coaches through creating their novel/literature project at home.
- set up the literacy fair in a Collaborate session to allow students to display their work and build classroom community.


About me

The Hook Sample:


One year, we focused on Dr. Seuss as an author study, the next year I asked the students to present their favorite book. Find a theme that fits your classroom.

Getting Started



Communicate you deadlines and expectations to families. Include dates for:



Project proposals-

You can get a head count of who is interested and make sure the student is challenging him/herself. Due 2-3 weeks before.

Project submissions

Due one week before. This allows you time to put your PowerPoint together to present the students' work.

Look for details on the next few slides.


The Main Event




- **1.** Go to tinyurl.com to create a shortened, personalized link for your Literacy Fair.
 - This allows students to invite family and other classes and school personnel can stop by.

2. Create a breakout room for each project.
Load your PowerPoints, pictures and links to the pages.

3. Allow people to 'roam' the pages and move themselves to breakout rooms..
