In our classroom, I will use a clip chart. This is used so students can visually see their behavior. Good behavior results in clipping up and bad behavior results in clipping down. I find it important to always look to reinforce positive behavior. Your child will always have opportunities to clip up, they just have to earn it.

We will also be using "I caught you" tickets. These tickets can be earned for being on task, being a leader, being a good friend, and more. They can trade in their tickets for little prizes (i.e. pencils, erasers, etc.) or save them to have 10 to earn special computer time. They can also earn tickets for staying above green through the day.
